§ 1 Geltungsbereich

Mit dieser Ordnung wird die Studienordnung für den Bachelorstudiengang International Management in der Neubekanntmachung vom 05.07.2017 wie folgt geändert.

§ 2 Änderungen

Die Regelung, mindestens eine internationale Blockveranstaltung zu absolvieren, wird eingeführt.

Die bisherige Bezeichnung „Leistungsnachweis“ wird durch „unbenotete Prüfungsleistung“ ersetzt.

In den Anlagen wurden die bisherigen Prüfungsleistungen an den geänderten ATPO (mit Wirkung zum 01.03.2019) angepasst.

§ 3 Übergangsregelungen

§ 1

Verweis auf weitere Regelungen

Diese Studienordnung enthält die verbindlichen wesentlichen Regelungen für ein ordnungsgemäßes Studium des Studiengangs International Management in Verbindung mit dem Besonderen Teil der Prüfungsordnung dieses Studiengangs sowie dem Allgemeinen Teil der Prüfungsordnung der Hochschule Osnabrück. Sie legt Aufbau und Inhalt des Studiengangs verbindlich fest, insbesondere die Modulbezeichnungen, deren Semesterlage, die Anzahl der Prüfungsleistungen, die zur Auswahl stehenden Prüfungsarten und die Leistungspunkte.

§ 2

Art und Umfang der Prüfungen

- (1) Art und Anzahl der benoteten und unbenoteten Prüfungsleistungen sowie die zugehörigen Prüfungsanforderungen des ersten Studienabschnitts sind in der Anlage 1 festgelegt.
- (2) Art und Anzahl der benoteten und unbenoteten Prüfungsleistungen sowie die zugehörigen Prüfungsanforderungen des zweiten Studienabschnitts sind in der Anlage 2 festgelegt.

§ 3

Auslandsstudiensemester

- ²⁾ The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of two written examinations (20 minutes each) and one written examination (15 minutes), one presentation and one oral examination. Each K20 is weighted by 20 points (20 percent). K15 is weighted by 10 points (10 percent). The presentation and the oral exam are weighted by 25 points (25 percent) each. (elements: K20 + K20 + K15 + PR + M; points: 20 + 20 + 10 + 25 + 25).

Portfolio exam for Chinese level 2: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (K1), one presentation (PR) and one oral examination (M). The written examination is weighted by 60 points (60 percent). The presentation and the oral examination are weighted by 20 points (20 percent) each.

Portfolio exam for Chinese level 3: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (90 minutes) and one presentation (PR). The written examination is weighted by 80 points (80 percent). The presentation is weighted by 20 points (20 percent).

Portfolio exam for Russian level 2:

PFP-1: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written paper (K1) and one oral examination (M). K1 and M are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

PFP-2: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (HA) and one presentation (PR). HA and PR are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

PFP-3: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of two written examinations (30 minutes each) and two oral examinations (M). Elements are weighted by 25 points (25 percent) each.

Portfolio exam for Russian level 3:

PFP-1: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written paper (K1) and one oral examination (M). K1 and M are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

PFP-2: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (HA) and one presentation (PR). HA and PR are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

Portfolio exam for Spanish level 3:

The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of two written examinations (30 minutes each), one presentation (PR) and one oral examination (M). Each K30 is weighted by 25 points (25 percent). PR is weighted by 30 points (30 percent) and M is weighted by 20 points (20 percent).

- ³⁾ As a rule, students will only be admitted to the module "Business Mathematics" if they have passed either the placement test or the preparatory course mathematics.

- 4) As a rule, students will only be admitted to a level of a foreign language course if they have passed the preceding course level (prerequisite) or if their initial placement test has shown the relevant results. Students can select their foreign business language from the following offer: Chinese, French, Spanish, Russian. International students (i. e. students who have obtained their school leaving certificate or university degree abroad) choose German if they do not have proven study competence (level 4 or B2 CEF) in German by means of one of the internationally recognised language certificates (e. g. by Goethe institute). Other languages can be taken as additional languages if they are necessary for the partner university to study abroad and/or replace the aforementioned on application and subject to approval from the Academic Dean. If Chinese or Russian is chosen, only the modules on level 2 (A2) and 3 (B1) have to be completed (instead of level 3 and 4).
- 5) There are no admission requirements for the module "Financial Accounting".
- 6) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one report (R) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
- 7) The portfolio exam covers 120 points and consists of a one-hour written examination (K1) and a final one-hour written examination (K1). Each K1 is weighted by 60 points.
- 8) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one presentation (PR) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
- 9) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written paper (HA) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The written paper and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
- 10) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consist of one written project report (PSC) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The project report and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
- 11) The portfolio exam covers 120 points and consists of one presentation (PR) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 60 points each.

- ⁴⁾ The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of two written examinations (20 minutes each) and one written examination (15 minutes), one presentation and one oral examination. Each K20 is weighted by 20 points (20 percent). K15 is weighted by 10 points (10 percent). The presentation and the oral exam are weighted by 25 points (25 percent) each. (elements: K20 + K20 + K15 + PR + M; points: 20 + 20 + 10 + 25 + 25).

Portfolio exam for Chinese level 3: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (90 minutes) and one presentation (PR). The written examination is weighted by 80 points (80 percent). The presentation is weighted by 20 points (20 percent).

Portfolio exam for Russian level 3:

PFP-1: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written paper (K1) and one oral examination (M). K1 und M are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

PFP-2: The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written examination (HA) and one presentation (PR). HA und PR are weighted by 50 points (50 percent) each.

Portfolio exam for Spanish level 4:

- The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of two written examinations (30 minutes each), one presentation (PR) and one oral examination (M). Each K30 is weighted by 25 points (25 percent). PR is weighted by 26 points (26 percent) and M is weighted by 24 points (24 percent).
- 5) Once the examination for the module Business Language 2 Level 4 (Chinese level 3 and Russian level 3) has been attempted, this language is automatically deemed to be 'Business Language 2' unless an application to the contrary was submitted prior to the completion of the module. Foreign students have to choose German as their second business language if they do not have proven study competence (level 4) in German by means of one of the internationally recognised language certificates (e. g. by Goethe institute).
 - 6) As a rule, students will only be admitted to a level of a foreign language course if they have passed the preceding course level (prerequisite) or if their initial placement test has shown the relevant results.
 - 7) Any module on an undergraduate level, i. e. from a Bachelor programme, which is taught in English, graded and in a second stage of a study programme can be taken as elective. The module "International Economics" is mandatory for students and can either be taken as part of the specialisation or as an elective.
 - 8) Regular participation in two block seminars at the students' option. At least one block seminar has to be of the kind "international". The regular participation in an international Summer University abroad that is credited with 5 ECTS replaces the participation in two block seminars.
 - 9) The number of contact-hours per week varies.
 - 10) The number of contact-hour per week varies according to the individual consultation per student.
 - 11) The „Scientifically reflected Practical Project“ is a compulsory internship with duration of 12 weeks.
 - 12) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of a one-hour written examination (K1) and a final one-hour written examination (K1). Each K1 is weighted by 50 points.
 - 13) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written paper (HA) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
 - 14) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one written project report (PSC) and one presentation with written report (R). PSC is weighted by 40 points and R is weighted by 60 points.
 - 15) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one report (R) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The report and the examination are weighted by 50 points.
 - 16) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one presentation (PR) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.

Organisation of Semester 4 (semester abroad):

As a rule, semester 4 is scheduled as the foreign study semester and is compulsory for both German students and students who have obtained their higher education entry qualification in Germany and foreign students respectively. Level 4 of the language of instruction at the chosen foreign university has to be completed as an admission requirement. Foreign students may be allowed to spend this semester at Hochschule Osnabrück if a substantiated application to that effect is submitted and if they prove to be sufficiently competent in German.

During their foreign study semester at a partner university, students need to select modules with a credit point value to the equivalent of 25 ECTS. 15 ECTS cover the specialisation abroad consisting of advanced modules of a special field and according to the course offer of the respective university. Another 10 ECTS are covered through electives with an international dimension. Both choices are made at the discretion of the student and are then to be agreed with the Faculty and fixed in a Learning Agreement. At least 20 ECTS credits have to be obtained abroad for the study semester abroad being evaluated as passed. Students completing their foreign study semester at HS Osnabrück (see above) have to complete their specialisation covering 15 ECTS as well as electives totalling 10 ECTS.

Exceptions to above regulations may be granted by the Dean of Studies.

 - 7) The portfolio exam covers 120 points and consists of one presentation (PR) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 60 points each.
 - 8) The portfolio exam covers 120 points and consists of a one-hour written examination (K1) and a final one-hour written examination (K1). Each K1 is weighted by 60 points.
 - 9) The portfolio exam covers 100 points and consists of one presentation (PR) and a one-hour written examination (K1). The presentation and the examination are weighted by 50 points each.
